

## FROM BARRY

When my father, of blessed memory, fell ill in his eighth decade, a new and emotionally charged sense dawned in me: I was entering the period of middle age when I must learn to navigate the complexities that arise as parents enter the late chapters of their lives. Caring for mothers and fathers who cared for us is a gift and a blessing, but it can also be very, very hard. That's the subject of tonight's play, Mala.

Melinda Lopez brings a deep sensitivity to this theme, drawing on her own experience with both of her parents as they confronted the health challenges and emotional upheavals of advanced age. It's a remarkable piece. With the commitment to truth that's the hallmark of a major artist, Melinda tells the story as it happened, with an openness and candor that I find bracing and even healing. She conjures the characters surrounding her parents with concision and wit, and her presentation of her mother—a walking, talking force majeure is a wonder to behold. She leaps off the page with a fury and a certain human majesty, and she is caustically and wondrously funny.

But her voice, which so defines the achievement of Melinda's writing, is much more nuanced than her dark jokes suggest. There's love and warmth in abundance in this play, but what I think makes it special is that Melinda is a realist. She pulls no punches, refusing to soften the indignities of disease and the anger it can trigger, not only in the person enduring it, but in their caregiver as well. The play's insight that human decline is a group affair strikes me as original and valuable, and it generates great empathy. Melinda's writing, so specific to her experience and so rooted in a concrete time and place, nonetheless makes me think about my own life and my own responses as my parents grew older, and that's the achievement of a genuine and truthful work of art.

The Globe is fortunate that Melinda Lopez is here to perform her play, which she did to acclaim onstage in Boston, and then, during the pandemic, on television there. She's a gifted actor, with a rich

command physically, emotionally, and vocally. I've also come to know her as a provocative thinker about theatre and what this art can be in our lives as we move forward after an extremely challenging period. It's a thrill to welcome her into this theatre's artistic family.

Throughout her career Melinda has explored her Cuban roots and her perspective on her own Latinx culture. That's another reason we're so proud to produce Mala. The Globe has redoubled its commitment to EDIA in our work—equity, diversity, inclusion, and access—as we've heeded clarion calls for all American institutions to examine their relationships to social justice as they serve their pluralistic communities. We've pledged to increase Spanish-language programming on our stages, and an important and exciting step in that work is that on selected nights, Mala will be performed in Spanish. We know that so many of our neighbors are looking forward to hearing their language and seeing their culture represented center stage in San Diego's flagship arts institution, and we are grateful for their support and very proud to welcome them. We'll be announcing more work like this in the time ahead.

*Mala* gets a beautiful and accomplished production from David Dower, another Bostonian, who, like Melinda, is central to why that great city is one of America's theatrical centers. We're proud to have him here, and grateful to the wonderful creative team he's assembled. Their lovely work is an exemplar of the Globe's values and an expression of the many ways in which our theatre emerges from a two-year crisis stronger and more vital than ever.

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## A NOTE FROM PLAYWRIGHT

Melinda Lopez

I don't usually perform my own work: I write plays, and other people act in them. But I am also a performer, and when I wrote *Mala*, it seemed this was a story I might tell. I am so honored to bring it to you.

The first parts of *Mala* were notes I wrote to myself on my iPhone during the Boston winter of 2015, a historically epic winter for New England that was also epic in more personal ways for my family. I wrote when I was overwhelmed in a waiting room or on hold during a critical phone call. I'd jot down a note because it seemed important at the time to remember everything as clearly as possible. I have a pretty bad memory, and I suspected that as soon as "things went back to normal," I would forget everything. So the cell phone helped. I discovered the notes a few years later: true to form, I had forgotten writing them, although the time they chronicled was crystal clear.

People who make things take chaos and impose order: a pile of wood becomes a table, fabric scraps become a quilt, flour and butter become a cake. We all want the thing we make to be useful and beautiful. I'm a writer, and experiences are the raw materials I use to make things. I wanted to take the chaos from the time I spent caring for my mother and make something useful and beautiful. I want to take you on a journey that is human and scary and shameful and funny—in the way that the truth is funny, that families are funny, that honesty is funny, and that even sometimes sad things are funny. A laugh can help us talk about things we never talk about. And talking with people you love about life and death is a very useful and beautiful thing.

At this moment, we're still waiting for things to go "back to normal." Our phones have become our closest companions, in a time when human companionship has become dangerous and life seems more fragile than ever. I wonder what notes you are writing. I wonder what stories we will tell each other about the last few years. I wonder what useful and beautiful things will come from this moment.

# KILLING ME

# SOFTLY

By Mala director David Dower

The quiet weeping. The convulsive laughter. The surge of sympathy for a character, suddenly turned to empathy when you realize it's your story they are telling.

I love the theatre. Art is one of the distinguishing capacities of the human—both to make it and to be reached by it. The capacity for surprise. And in the theatre there is a doubling of its power. The art is live, in the room with you, and your presence and your response affect it. And there you are, in a darkened room with strangers—neighbors who are also affected by it, also impacting it, also swept into it. You are in communion for the length of the performance. The live arts breathe the same air as the audience.

As the director of *Mala*, I've been thinking about the special power of the theatre across multiple productions with Melinda Lopez.

Charles Fox and Norman Gimbel wrote a song that Roberta Flack made famous in 1973. In 1997 a new version launched the career of Lauryn Hill with her hip-hop group The Fugees. "Killing Me Softly" was about the experience of being in the audience when a live performance started to tell the story of its narrator.

"I heard he sang a good song, I heard he had a style, And so I came to see him, to listen for a while..."

I have witnessed dozens of performances of this play since we premiered it in Boston. In each case, the audience has come to listen for a while. They'd heard something of Melinda, or the subject matter, or they were subscribers to the theatre that was presenting the production. Their decision was as uncomplicated as the narrator in the song. But things shift as they listen.

"Strumming my pain with his fingers, Singing my life with his words, Killing me softly with his song, Telling my whole life with his words, Killing me softly..."

At some point in every performance, the quality of listening in the room shifts as audience member after audience member realizes Melinda is telling their life. And at each show, audiences are moved to tell their own story, whether to Melinda or the person sitting next to them or the usher or the artistic director. Or they sit quietly in their seat and tell it to themselves.

With *Mala*, Melinda's taking aim at the human capacity to be ordinary. She's opened her heart and her private grief to share her experience in communion with strangers out of a deep faith in us, in art, and in the power of empathy to call us to our higher selves.

There will be laughter. There will be tears. There will be beauty. There will be grace. And, in these divided days, there will be a story told by a stranger that weaves together with your story and with the stories of those around you, knitting us back together as a community, as a city, as "we the people." Still searching for a more perfect union. But awake to our shared humanity.

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## coda (noun) co-da \ 'kō-də


: an ending part of a piece of music or a work of literature or drama that is separate from the earlier parts

: something that ends and completes something else

On the final page of Melinda Lopez's manuscript for *Mala* is the following note to the production: "The coda doesn't have to be anything. Or maybe it's a projection in the dark. Or just an idea in the mind of Mala." It is followed by Rumi's beautiful poem "The Guest House."

We include it here because many of you may not be able to see it or read it at the theatre and we feel certain she's right that it is related to the experience of the play. We toyed with a variety of ways to include it inside the experience and all felt heavy-handed. (On the first page of the manuscript, Melinda writes, "Everything needs a light touch. Super, super light.") So we have often projected the poem after Melinda's final bow, or shared it in the program, as we do here.

Read the poem and contemplate it a bit. You'll see how right Melinda was about it belonging with the journey of Mala. ■

## **BARRY EDELSTEIN**

(Erna Finci Viterbi Artistic Director) is a stage director, producer, author, and educator. His Globe directing credits include The Winter's Tale, Othello, The Twenty-Seventh Man, the world

premiere of Rain, Picasso at the Lapin Agile, Hamlet, the world premiere of *The Wanderers*, the American premiere of Life After, Romeo and Juliet, and, during the pandemic, *Hamlet: On the Radio*. He also directed All's Well That Ends Well as the inaugural production of the Globe for All community tour, and he oversees the Globe's Classical Directing Fellowship program. In addition to his recent Globe credits, he directed *The Tempest* with the Los Angeles Philharmonic at Walt Disney Concert Hall in 2018, and he will next direct The Wanderers Off Broadway with Roundabout Theatre Company in 2023. As Director of the Shakespeare Initiative at The Public Theater (2008–2012), Edelstein oversaw all of the company's Shakespearean productions as well as its educational, community outreach, and artist-training programs. At The Public, he staged the world premiere of *The Twenty-Seventh* Man, Julius Caesar, The Merchant of Venice, Timon of Athens, and Steve Martin's WASP and Other Plays. He was also Associate Producer of The Public's Broadway production of The Merchant of Venice starring Al Pacino. From 1998 to 2003 he was Artistic Director of Classic Stage Company. His book *Thinking Shakespeare* is the standard text on American Shakespearean acting. He is also the author of Bardisms: Shakespeare for All Occasions. He is a graduate of Tufts University and the University of Oxford, where he studied as a Rhodes Scholar.



## TIMOTHY J. SHIELDS

(Audrey S. Geisel Managing Director) joined The Old Globe as Managing Director in 2017. In his time in San Diego, he has enjoyed becoming involved in the community. He currently serves

as a board member of the San Diego Regional Chamber of Commerce's LEAD program; an advisory board member of the San Diego Downtown Partnership; and Vice President of the Balboa Park Cultural Partnership. He brings to San Diego many decades of not-for-profit theatre experience. He was Managing Director of Princeton, New Jersey's McCarter Theatre Center (2009-2017); Milwaukee Repertory Theater (1998–2009); and Geva Theatre Center in Rochester, New York (1992-1998). He has also held administrative positions at Children's Theatre Company in Minneapolis, Denver Center Theatre Company, and McCarter Theatre Center in an earlier period of his career. He served as President of the League of Resident Theatres and as Vice President of the board at Theatre

Communications Group. He has been the Chair of the ArtPride NJ board; a member of Milwaukee's Latino Arts Board; and a board member of the Cultural Alliance of Greater Milwaukee. He holds a B.F.A. in Drama Production from Carnegie-Mellon University in his hometown of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

## MAKING THEATRE MATTER

TO MORE PEOPLE: Linational I dition

In March 2020, the San Ysidro border crossing closed to nonessential travel. This could have left some binational community members unable to access Globe programs. However, arts engagement programming moved entirely online at the same time. Building artistic, digital programs reduced the relevance of physical borders during a time in history that highlighted the relevance of globewide connections.

Now, for the first time ever, The Old Globe's arts engagement programs are launching in Tijuana in 2022. The international collaborations that sprang up in the digital programming era will continue, starting with two Detrás del Telón theatre design workshop series and the spring Globe for All Tour of Mala. First-time partnerships include Tijuana Hace Teatro, a company offering arts programs, performances, and devised community-based theatre, and Centro Cultural Tijuana, a huge cultural hub of free and low-cost programs and presentations of performing and fine arts.

The digital versions of arts engagement programs such as Spanish-language design workshop Detrás del Telón, community gathering Breaking Bread, and Mad Libs-inspired collaboration Word Up! were specifically shaped to welcome our neighbors 20 minutes south in Tijuana as collaborators and participants, along with our neighbors stretched across North County, East County, South Bay, and more. The engagement and impact of these programs demonstrated a strong readiness and benefit for community members on both sides of the border to engage with each other through the arts. Now, as programming moves back in person, we continue developing binational partnerships to hold physical space for our Tijuana neighbors, reflecting the digital space that proved so



significant in our mission to make theatre matter to more people.

At the helm of this new development is Valeria Vega, a Tijuana-based, binational, multifaceted theatre artist. Since Valeria joined the Teaching Artist team in 2018, she has crossed the border daily to provide creative experiences and opportunities to community members across San Diego. She advocated for the value of binational programming and laid the groundwork for it, and now leads the exploration of how engagement across the border can support the values and mission of The Old Globe and build partnerships and procedures.

"Every time I crossed the border, I imagined I was bringing these two great cities together, and every back and forth made that feeling stronger," said Vega. "Now that the giant leap is done, we must continue running and keep uniting humanity through theatre."
